

PARSS Legislative Update Friday, October 20, 2023

A Quick Review and Status of Legislative Action

The divided legislature is still seeking a compromise that would allow it to authorize up to \$1.1 billion in additional spending via code bills.

- 1). In late August, the Senate passed a 103-page **fiscal code bill (HB 1300)** that would reauthorize some routine programs while excluding Democratic priorities.
 - The bill also authorizes \$100 million appropriated for a school mental health grant program.
 - House Democrats amended the Senate proposal to authorize several caucus proposals.
 - Senate Majority Leader Pittman has not said if he would bring the bill up for a vote, or further amend the bill.
- 2). House Democrats have also advanced an original **tax code bill (HB 1219)**. The legislation includes proposals championed by Republicans and business groups, but it also contains top Democratic priorities.
 - Senate Majority Leader Pittman called the tax bill "intriguing" and a "step in the right direction". He did not say if he would bring the bill up for a vote.

- 3). House Democrats took a **school code (HB 27)** proposal from the Senate and expanded it with several priorities.
 - Senate Republicans passed HB 27 to extend Act 91 provisions, and authorize \$100 million appropriated for a school mental health grant program as well as funding for physical school safety grants.
 - o House Democrats amended that bill, adding in caucus proposals (Level Up, a school environmental repair grant program, a student teacher stipend program, etc.).
 - o Senate Majority Leader Pittman has not said if he would bring the bill up for a vote, or further amend the bill.
